In our case the Revd Andrew Emison has been away, first on sabbatical and then on holiday, and we shall welcome him back most warmly in September. We trust that his time of absence from normal ministerial commitments will have enabled him to achieve what he and Naomi wished at the outset – a mixture of recharging batteries, spiritual reflection, personal relaxation, and eclectic exploration – and that Andrew will feel that it has been a blessing.

However, a word of warning: as many ministers have found, sabbaticals can be cathartic experiences! Come September 1st we need to prepare ourselves, not just to welcome Andrew back amongst us, but to be sensitive to his re-entry (and indeed keep in mind his added pastoral responsibilities in Kingsley) and to be open and receptive to fresh insights and inspiration which may have touched him during his recent sojourn.

Of course, we look forward to hearing whatever Andrew wishes to share with us over the coming weeks and months, but all in good time. Let's just be pleased to see him back with us and events – of which there are always plenty in the Autumn – will take their majestic course.

As ever, September heralds the beginning of the new Methodist year, and as Andrew leads worship and celebrates Holy Communion on Sunday the 11th, we can share together as the Norley Methodist congregation in a renewed act of dedication and commitment to God's mission through us in the local community and wider world.

As Charles Wesley so aptly put it, capturing the faithfulness of God, 'we'll praise him for all that is past, and trust him for all that's to come'. Amen to that!

The June Church Council Meeting

Our June Church Council was Chaired byRev'd David Bintliff (in Andrew's absence), and here is a summary of the main points that were discussed and agreed:

- The ongoing issues with planning cover for Sunday services was discussed and this is likely to be anissue for some time. The Church Council agreed that we should holda conversation with friends at the Hurst, Kingsley, to consider the possibility of occasional joint services.
- Our finances, as a church, continue to be in good order and noted with thanks to everyone and John as our Treasurer.
- The Church Council agreed to proceed with booking a decorator to undertake external decorating of the building in the next year.
- Our outreach in the local community was discussed and some ideas shared for what we
 might realistically do over the next year. These included continuing to publicise services,
 possibly some carol singing at the Tiger's Head, running a simple lunch or coffee
 morning and looking at how we could work towards being an eco-Church as a means of
 Outreach. Ideas will be discussed more widely with everyone over the next few months –
 further details will be included in the notices.
- We agreed to organise a music concert as a charity fundraiser, and following the meeting, Michael has arranged this for October. (Further details will be posted elsewhere).
- Revds. David Goodwin and David Bintliff moved from the Circuit in August. A new Deacon will be taking up post (based in Chester) from September – though the shortage of Ministers will require some changes in the Circuit.
- Some national changes due for discussion at the Conference, may affect smaller churches in the Circuit and how they operate. The changes are unlikely to affect Norley, and further details will be reported from the Circuit as decisions are taken nationally.
- As part of our relaxation of Covid measures, we are revising the booking system for accessing the church building. As a temporary measure, a paper calendar has been placed on the noticeboard in the Open-Door room. This will be checked regularly by the Church Council Secretary for clashes – so please try and keep it up to date! The need for leaving 24 hours between different people access the building was agreed to be no longer necessary. We hope to move this to an online diary quite soon.
- The next Church Council meeting will be on 4th October.

One striking sculpture, a tall tree carving bears two faces of the Marbury Lady, one proud and regal the other depicting her sad demise. The twelve sculptures arranged around the park made for an informative and interesting Wednesday walk.

Models of Spinner and Bergamot, the Marbury family's favourite horses reminded us the that lunch was calling and we dined at the pub of that name in Comberbach.

carried on into Nettleford Wood and climbed to the view point on Pale Heights, where we stopped for coffee.

Although we did not visit it, this is close to the Triangulation (Trig) point which marks the 'Delamere Meridian'. This played a central role in the production of the first



Ordnance Survey maps that would then remain as the standard until the new National Grid system was introduced in the 1940's. The weather was overcast with occasional attempts at light rain, but the views were still good.

A personal highlight was one of the morning Bible studies we did together in the communal tent, digging deeper into the death and resurrection of Jesus (a side track from the story of Jesus washing Peters feet), and getting to see a deeper understanding dawn on some of the groups faces and of course, Molly standing up for the first time to commit herself to Jesus.

OPAL is the charity we have selected from those chosen at the Annual Church Meeting to receive the proceeds from our Autumn concert. The following gives some background on the charity

Introducing OPAL Services

The aim of OPAL (Older People Active Lives) is to reduce social isolation amongst older people in rural West Cheshire.

The Charity was born in 2011 with the original purpose of managing several day services for older people in rural locations, Over the years this service, has grown into 6 Opal Clubs located in Frodsham, Helsby, Kelsall, Tattenhall, Tarporley and Malpas. The clubs provide a much-valued lifeline, getting people out of their houses and connecting with others for a home cooked lunch, a chat and activities.

The range of services provided by OPAL over the last 10 years has also expanded, and this now includes:

- Opal Go Online Service which offers older people and their carers opportunities to become more confident and competent in using the various types of communication technology – to keep in touch with family and friends and to make some practical everyday tasks such as shopping and banking easier.
- Carers support services including respite breaks to carers and opportunities for carers to connect with other carers and offer mutual support and receive information about other support and services available.
- Branching Out and What's Cooking where we bring people together in informal and welcoming settings, with opportunities to become involved in a variety of local community activities (such as walking groups, art groups, knit & natter).

OPAL relies heavily on the generous gifts and donations to operate its services, and these contributions can make a big difference to what we can provide to support to older people and their carers.

On behalf of all at 'OPAL' we are grateful to all at Norley Methodist Church choosing us as one of your chosen charities for this year.

Property Matters



Since the last Outreach, the hot water in the kitchen has at last been reinstated. The old water heater has been scrapped and 2 in line water heaters installed which do not run out of hot water, but only provide really hot water at a moderate flow rate. Still at least it is done. In addition, the rotten wood in the purlin by the kitchen was repaired. The repair to the Sunday school room ceiling has been held over to the next connectional year.

The main activity has been specifying the external redecoration for August 2023, obtaining 3 quotes from reputable painters and decorators, choosing the best quote, getting church council approval for it and setting a purchase order with Ryan Holland Decorators for the sum of £5430. We await the return of the signed purchase order and then the work is complete.

Solar Panels Update

The panels continued to perform well over the summer, and in the last 3 months generated a further 1464Kwh of electricity.and we received a cheque for that of £912.

In the 10 ¼ years the panels have been inservice we have generated 35464Kwh and have received more than £18,250 return on our investment of £7,500.

Useful things SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring books etc.

COOL GEAR

Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set.

HYGIENE ITEMS

Toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Good News – these can now go in shoeboxes
