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Dear Friends,

I am writing this letter just before the beginning of Lent, during which many Methodist churches up and down the country will be reflecting on different Bible readings in the light of Charles Wesley's famous hymn, "Love divine, all loves excelling." Simply because the hymn talks about love, it has been a favourite 'wedding hymn' for many people over the years. Yet it is much more than that. 'Love divine' puts into words some of the most important themes preached by Charles' brother, John Wesley (the founder of the Methodist movement). Firstly, it celebrates the love of God – seen most of all in the life of Jesus Christ. Wesley preached that the love of God was not reserved for a chosen few' – instead, it was *for all*: "pure, unbounded love thou art". This theme continues to be at the heart of our message as a church today: that in Jesus Christ God offers life-enriching love to each and every one of us, each and every day of our lives.

But the hymn goes even further. It speaks about the way that the love of God can change our lives. Wesley preached that, if we allow God to work in us, our lives may be changed by God's Spirit so that they become more Christ-like. Being 'perfect', in Wesley's eyes, is not a matter of being "holier than thou". It does not mean being better than others. It doesn't mean knowing the right answer to every biblical question in the local pub quiz! It means that your life shining with the love of Jesus, to help others to know more of that love for themselves: "changed (by God's work in us) from glory into glory" until we are "lost in wonder, love and praise".

When we tell the story of the life of Jesus – and especially when we recall the final days of his earthly life – we are reminded that this is not simply a gentle story of romantic love. In a broken world, a divided and sometimes brutal world, living a life which aims to reach out to comfort and change the lives of others for the better is costly. Inviting others – especially those who enjoy the benefits of power – to show more generosity in sharing the earth's gifts can lead to conflict. For Christ himself it led to his death on the Cross. Yet the power of God's love in Christ was shown to be unstoppable. Even as the world crucified him, his love for all the world was on display. And on Easter Day those who thought that their world had collapsed because of his death discovered new life in his risen life.

All this leads me to wish **you** a very happy Easter! May you be touched by God's love in Christ; and may your life shine with the light of the risen Christ.

Solar Panels Update

At the end of February by the time this magazine is published, the solar panels will have been in service for 12 years. A reading will be submitted shortly, but up until 3 months ago we had generated over 40,000Kwh of electricity and have received over £21,900 from our investment of £7,500 with another 14 years of generation to get paid for *Bruce Lane*

The Church Leadership Team



The CLT met twice during the quarter. At the first meeting on 12 December the CLT

- -agreed to phase out communion wafers to precut cubes of bread after the covenant service.
- -agreed that the Digital Music system should be used by the stewards for 1 hymn each week from the end of the current plan.
- -decided that the additional questions now raised for a further safeguarding audit could be dealt with by a virtual Church Council in January
- -noted that the appointment of Neil as our Authorised Person for Same Sex Marriages had not yet been confirmed. (subsequently

resolved)

- -approved Lesley's offer to generate a draft policy document for sharing information.
- -were updated by the property steward on progress reported elsewhere in this edition.
- -noted a letter Michael Gough had received from the Squirrels Pre School currently operating out of the Delamere Park Community Centre. After 40 years, they have to leave their existing premises in May 2024 and are keen to explore if moving to Norley Methodist Church for the 39 week per year Monday to Friday from 8.30 3.30 was attractive to both parties. A subgroup of Michael Gough, Ruth Lane, John Dimelow and Lesley Gough agreed to explore the feasibility and report back to the CLT by the end of January.
- -decided as a consequence, the meeting of those in the village interested in the Café Project would be put on hold until these discussions were resolved

The second meeting on February 1st

- -concluded after a long debate about the Squirrels Pre School where the sub-group detailed their findings that the idea had to be taken to the Church Council meeting in March with the recommendation regretfully that this was not for us, being too disruptive to the activities of the church.
- -decided that the planned meetings about the potential use of the ODR as a café could now go ahead.
- -approved a quotation presented by the property stewards for plumbing work to restore heat to the kitchen and lounge as mentioned in the property report.
- -set Sunday June 9th as the date for the annual church meeting to be led by Neil
- -received an update from Neil on the progress in stationing for next September, which remains very fluid.

Finance Review

It's still too early to give a full half-year report - that will be presented to the Church Council in March – but as other contributions to Outreach reveal, we have enjoyed some splendid events which have raised funds for external charities and incurred significant property expenses, some planned and some not.

Donations made to external charities from September to the end of January, including



gift-aid where possible, were as follows:

£1168.75 to West Cheshire Foodbank, including Harvest gifts.

£962.50 to Christian Aid, from the Christmas Concert + £125 personal donation.

£325 to Samaritan's Purse, with the shoeboxes.

£275 to Mid-Cheshire Samaritans, from the carol-singing evening.

£275 to All We Can (MRDF as was), from the Christmas Day collection.

£100 to OPAL, at Coffee+ in December.

This all adds up to £3106.25 – an extraordinary achievement, for which many thanks to all. In addition, the Church Council made donations to Englesea Brook Chapel and Museum of £200 and to Norley News of £100.

On the property front (planned), the costs associated with the Open Door Room facelift amounted to £3674 and we were generously given grants from the circuit (£1000) and the district (£2000) on the basis that the project is enhancing the church premises for mission. The secondary double-glazing in the church cost £3195 and was funded from drawing down surplus balance from the CFB deposit account. The outcome of these welcome initiatives is that the deposit account now holds just the amount we need to retain for reserves.

Unplanned property expenses relate to the boiler (ensuring that its fires up on all occasions, £540) and the central heating pipework (£101 so far but will rise towards £1500 as plumbing and electrical works are completed). No cause for financial alarm, as the reserves will tide us over, but the treasurer will continue to monitor the situation as always.

Update from the Spiritual Committee

We give thanks for our continuing witness as a Methodist Society in Norley.

Our **Christmas** celebrations, enjoyed by many, included Carol Singing 'around the tree', a candle-lit Carol Service, and a fund-raising concert for Christian Aid which raised c. £950.

Our **Covenant Service** was held on 7th January and led by

Rev'd David Copley.

As we approach **Lent** this year the conflicts of the world are very much in our thoughts. Without peace we are diverted from so many other concerns and situations. We pray that God will gift our leaders the wisdom of Christ and raise-up the 'peacemakers'.

Our theme for Lent is 'liberation', in all its forms. Each of the six weeks of Lent will be marked with a particular context of liberation:

- Poverty: "Whoever is kind to the poor lends to the Lord and will be repaid in full." (Proverbs 19:17)
- **Injustice**: '... what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?' (Micah 6:8)
- **Conflict**: 'The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them.' (Isaiah 11:6)
- III-health & Disability: 'I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works' (Psalm 139:14)
- **Climate-Change**: 'that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.' (Romans 8:21)
- **Self**: 'Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. Do not cast me away from your presence, and do not take your holy spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation and sustain in me a willing spirit.' (Psalm 51:10-12)

Our Lent liturgy will feature seven candles, with one being extinguished each week and on Good Friday.

• **Good Friday**: Jesus said, 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.' (John 13:34-35)

All seven candles will be re-lit on Easter Sunday.

• Easter Sunday: For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. (John 3:16)



Property Matters

Since the last Outreach it has been an even busier time for the property stewards

John Dimelow has taken over as the lead property steward from 1 Jan 2024 from Bruce who will be a property consultant to John.

Upgrading the Open Door Room (ODR)

The internal ODR redecoration is now complete, and the piano has been removed. The electrical cable rerouting has been completed by Mike Wilson, for which many thanks, so the upgrading is virtually complete. Just the brown panelling needs refreshing

Secondary double glazing of the small windows in the main church



Following the grants from the Circuit and District towards the upgrading of the ODR the secondary double glazing in the main church has been completed having been previously provisionally approved by the Church Council and paid for from our reserves.

Heating Problems

You will remember that the ODR heating was partially restored in October but without the kick heater in the kitchen, the lounge radiator, and those in front of the toilets and in the vestry. In this last quarter a convector heater has been purchased and installed in the space in front of the toilets to replace the radiator, now removed, and an estimate approved for the restoration of heating in the kitchen and the lounge. An installation date is awaited.

In addition, the gas valve on the boiler has been replaced last month and the notice board plastic cover sheet has been renewed.

The other remaining jobs planned for the connectional year are the installation of a double socket by the toilets for the new heater, where a quotation has been accepted and the work is likely to be complete before this magazine reaches you, and the completion of the exterior redecoration snagging list.

John and Lewis have redecorated the vestry over the last 2 weeks to excellent effect and are planning some redecoration of the kitchen once the plumbing work is completed.

Thank you to everyone for your continuing support via monetary donations and / or donation of food and other items. We are pleased to rescribe we gay, developed a link with the new proprietors of Norley Stores, and they community donations which are 'converted' into food items in store and their taken along to the depot in Ellesmere Port together with our own collection.

With the cost-of-living crisis, more and more people are making the choice between 'eating or heating' and having to cut back the amount they have available to spend on food, reliance on the foodbanks continues to grow. In the last 6 months, the West Cheshire Foodbank has seen over 1100 first time referrals for assistance.

What's in a food parcel?

The Food banks have worked with nutrition ets to make sure that the food parcels supplied by food banks in our network contain at least three days' worth of nutritionally balanced meals for individuals and families. These emergency food parcels are not designed to meet long term need—that's why lood banks also offer additional support like debt advice where possible.

A typical food parcel includes coreal, sour pasta, rice, tinned tomatoes/ pasta sauce, entils, beans and pulses, tinned meat, tinned vegetables, tea/coffee, tinned fruit, biscuits,

Non-food items

It's natural that the first thing anyone thinks to donate to a food bank is food, but toiletries and hygiene products are also extremely important. Alongside the standard food parcel food banks try to provide other essential non-food items to adults and children in crisis.

These include: toiletries – deodorant, toilet paper, shower gel, shawing gel, shampoo, soap, toothbrushes, tooth paste, hand wipes, baby wipes, nappies, dete gent, washing up liquid and baby food.
