Dear friends,

When I started my car a few days ago the radio came on in the middle of a conversation with the broadcaster David Attenborough. He was talking about some of the moments from his long career, including a time when he made contact with a remote community in the Amazon jungle. Aerial photographs had suggested that people were living in the area; but no one had ever met them. After journeying into the forest, he and his cameraman camped out for the night. He described waking up to discover that they were surrounded by the eyes of a number of villagers, all looking carefully at them. It could have been a difficult, even dangerous, encounter. They had no shared language. Yet, through his deep knowledge and experience, he was able through small hand gestures and facial expressions to communicate a sense of goodwill and common humanity.

In the story of the first Christian Pentecost in Acts 2, the disciples of the risen Christ were inspired to share the good news of God's love with those around them – even though the crowd included people from all over the known world.

In Paul's letter to the Colossians, chapter 3, he advises a young church: "*Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, ... be thankful. Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you ..., teach and encourage one another in worship.*" And then he says, "*whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks through Him to God the Father.*" (Colossians 3:15-17)

Christian witness does not have to involve eloquent, polished sermons – carefully thought through and argued. Most often it is done with simple, honest, encouraging words offered to those around us. And sometimes it is done through small acts of kindness, a helping hand, or an encouraging smile.

Whatever challenges lie ahead of us, may the peace of Christ be at the heart of all we do; and may God help us to share good news in word and action.

## Church Council Meeting – March 2023

Our Church Council met in March. The regular reports from the Pastoral committee, Spiritual committee as well as finance, property and safeguarding were all received, with thanks to all who contribute to these aspects of our Church. Further details of these are reported elsewhere in this edition of Outreach and here is a summary of the additional topics which were discussed.

**Consideration of interest in a community café based in our Church.** As a way of extending our outreach and building relationships with the local community, the Church Council agreed that we should find out if there is interest in us running a weekly community café, and equally importantly, if there are potential volunteers to help amongst the local residents.

Mike Wilson is kindly leading the project and the Church Council agreed that the questionnaire that Mike has put together, should be used as a means of gathering the information. Keep a check in the notices for further updates about the questionnaire, and the Church Council will in due course be considering the findings.

**Preparing the Church Building for Mission:** You will be aware that we have recently established monthly coffee mornings and 'soup and pudding' lunches. As a further 'new development', we will be trialling a monthly informal worship service, and considering other ways in which we may further use our building to support and engage with the local community. The Church Council agreed that some improvements to the Open-Door room and additional changes (specifically putting wi-fi into the Church) should be considered. These will be costed up over the next few months and hopefully will be agreed (with a timeline) at the next meeting.

**Update from the Circuit:** Circuit Steward, Simon Kelly, attends our Church Council meetings and he reported that work has been taking place to develop a 'Circuit Vision'. Linked to this, Churches in the Circuit are going to be asked a series of questions in the next few months, which will help determine our requirements as a Circuit for Presbyters, lay workers etc. The timescale for the next round of appointments of Presbyters is expected to be September 2024 (with the stationing process commencing later in 2023).

## **1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday Walks**

This walk was led by Peter & Sheila, and was a visit to Pennington Flash Nature Reserve near Wigan. Eleven members enjoyed a short walk round the several lakes and the canal side in this reserve. This was an unusual walk, as we spent more time at the various hides, looking at the birds, both on the water and at feeding stations set up for them, than we did walking. This was much enjoyed by all those who came, although a few cut out the canal extension. After the visit we went to the nearby 'Robin Hood' pub for a meal.

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Ten of us were available for the April First Wednesday Walk which was around Moore Nature Reserve near Daresbury. The weather forecast was quite dire with intermittent rain

showers expected throughout the day, but we were very fortunate that the rain stopped before we arrived at Moore and did not return until we were driving back to the Leigh Arms for lunch.

Our walk was a circular route of approximately 2 miles around the reserve and although the conditions were not ideal, being rather damp and gloomy, we were able to appreciate the fresh green shoots of spring as well as the splash of colour of primroses and trees in blossom. Perhaps the highlight for me was a bird cherry in full bloom. The bird cherry is a native British tree and is quite stunning when covered in its sweet smelling blossom (but don't try to eat the small bitter cherries that appear later in the year!).

Although birdsong was all around us as we walked, we were rather disappointed in that our actual sightings were very limited. Maybe due to the rather dull conditions.

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The sun shone brightly as nine nifty walkers set off to explore the Brereton Heath Nature Reserve near Holmes Chapel in May. Heather & Anthony led the group, which were occupied in spotting the birdlife & the amazing native flowers & trees, which are really lovely at this time of year. We hoped the bluebells would be out for the walk, so it became a game of bluebell spotting all morning.

We were made very welcome at The Old Red Lion for our lunch & judging by the empty plates at the end of lunch, must have gone down well. After lunch we toured the extensive Coronation decorations created by the talented local craft groups of Holmes Chapel. We even had our photo taken beside a life size knitted creation of King Charles 3.

## Solar Panels Update

The reading for the next quarter has just been submitted – and it shows a further 1020Kwh generated in the last 3 months, and the treasurer will shortly receive a payment of £635.

In the 11¼ years then we have generated over 38000Kwh of electricity and will have received more than £20,200 from our investment of £7,500 with another 14 years of generation to get paid for.

## An update from the West Cheshire Foodbank:

On Wednesday 26 April 2023, we released our stats on the number of emergency food parcels that West Cheshire Foodbank provided within our local community between April 2022 and March 2023.

The alarming new figures reveal that we have provided **16408** emergency food parcels to people who couldn't afford the essentials in our area over the last year – and **5973** of these went to children.

In addition to this, food banks across the Trussell Trust network provided nearly 3 million (2,986,203) emergency food parcels to people experiencing hunger during this time – with over 1 million of these going to children.



This is the most parcels food banks in the network have ever distributed in a single year and represents a 37% increase compared to last year, **and more than double** the amount distributed by food banks in the same period five years ago.

**This isn't right and we can't allow this to go on.**

Together, with food banks across the Trussell Trust network, we are calling for MPs across the UK to support a social security system that guarantees our essentials, by making sure that the basic rate of Universal Credit is at least enough to afford the essentials we all need to live.

No one should need the support of our food bank because everyone in our local community should be able to live lives free from hardship and poverty.

**That's why your support is needed now more than ever.**

As we navigate these challenging times and do our utmost to meet the increasing need for our services, we would be most grateful if you could please donate food or toiletries or make a financial donation.

We recognise how difficult times are right now, which is why we really appreciate all and any support you are able to offer. Together, we can ensure help is here for everyone who needs it in West Cheshire, whilst we also collectively work towards a more just future where no one needs our food bank to get by. Thank you for all that you're doing.

## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

For those who regularly attend, **Food for Thought** (FfT) offers lively, worshipful discussions in a café church environment.

The FfT meeting in March, which was led by Michael Gough, considered the Gaia Exhibition that was held at Chester Cathedral and explored the theological idea of *seeing* '**Christ in everything**'. Our April FfT was led by Deacon Tim Coleman on the practical subject of '**Chaplaincy Everywhere**'.

Our last FfT before a summer recess will be on 18<sup>th</sup> May and will be led by our own Dr. Bruce Lane who will be examining '**Scouting Law and Promises**'. These are valuable acts of worship and fellowship in the life of our church - please support these meetings as often you can. FfT will resume in September – see next edition of Outreach for the schedule.

**Christian Aid Week (14<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> May).** This year, *Cyclone Freddy*, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days), hit **Malawi** and **Mozambique**. Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone.

The number of people affected by the Tropical Cyclone in Malawi continues to rise. Over 508,000 people are displaced, and hundreds have lost their lives. There's also an increased risk of malaria and cholera in the aftermath.

Food, fuel, fertiliser and school fees have doubled in price in the last 12 months. Hard-working farmers are seeing their harvests fail as the climate crisis brings increasingly erratic weather.

## St George's Day Parade

God Save the King was sung in the Church for the first time in 70 years.

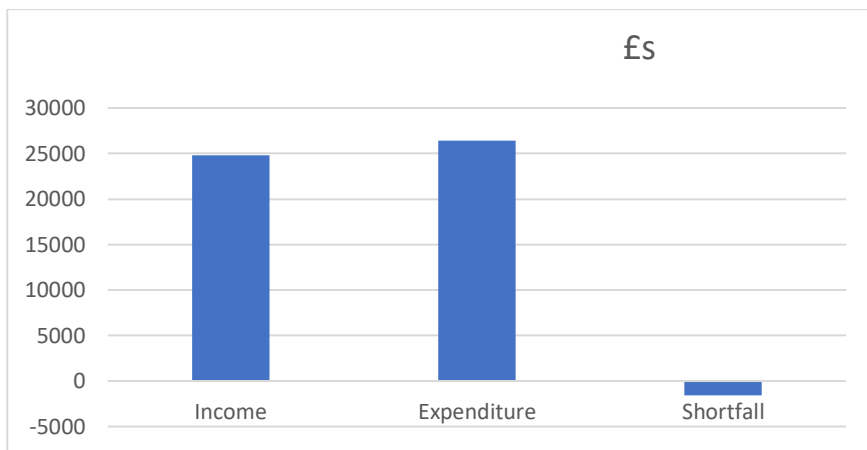
The Scout Group then paraded back to the Tigers to round off the morning.

## Promised Overview of the Church Finances

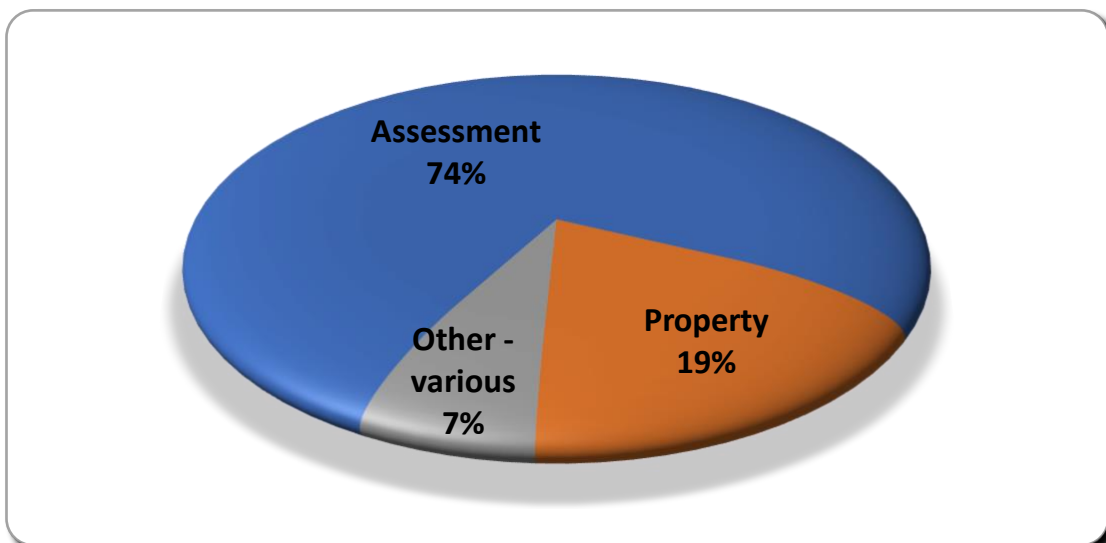
Outreach readers who receive the weekly notice-sheet may recall that, for a few weeks in April, I inserted a piece about the church finances outlining that, in the last three years, regular income has not quite kept up with regular expenditure and inviting members of the congregation to consider if they could increase their offerings, whether by bank standing orders, using envelopes or loose cash. To balance the books for the normal week-to-week running of the church – excluding discretionary elements such as special events, donations to charities and new property projects – I advised that, overall, an increase in offerings of 7% would be most welcome.

As promised in that notice, a summary of the normal expenditures in keeping the church going and the incomes needed to meet them is now presented, based on the expected figures for the Methodist financial year September 2023 to August 2024.

The chart below shows that the expected expenditure of £26,400 exceeds the expected income of £24,800 by £1600, and this is the shortfall we need to make up. The difference looks small on the chart, but it is very significant in reality.



The first pie-chart shows the main categories of **expenditure**, followed by a brief explanation of each.

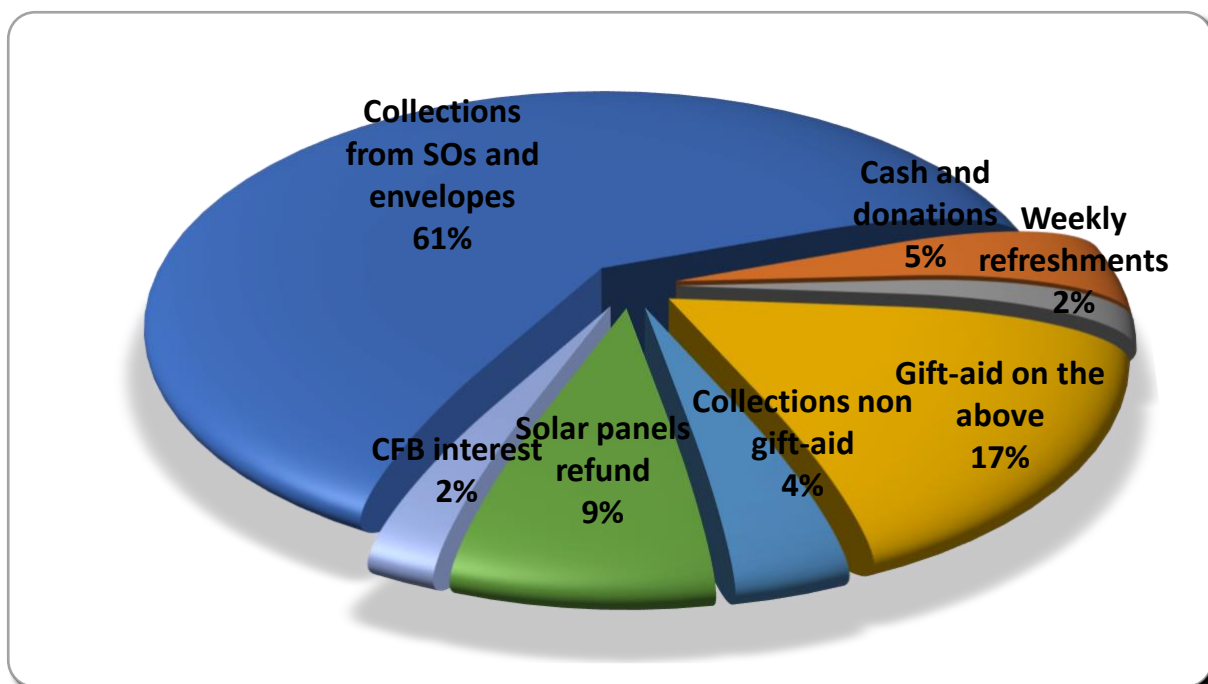


The circuit **assessment** (a traditional Methodist word!) is paid every quarter to the North Cheshire circuit to cover the costs of ministers (stipends, pensions, national insurance, manses, travel etc) and lay workers (administrative and pastoral), other circuit expenses and the assessment levied by the Chester and Stoke-on-Trent District, which itself contributes to cover the Connexional Methodist Church expenses. That it accounts for such a high proportion (i.e., three-quarters) of church expenditure is self-evident and it is the first call on church funds. Whatever else we do, we must pay the assessment!

**Property** costs include organ tuning, the music licence, insurance, electricity and gas, cleaning, boiler servicing, fire and electrics checks, hedge-cutting, the garden bin as well as repairs and maintenance to the premises, inside and outside. These are all essential.

**Other** costs cover everything else – a wide spectrum – including printing, posters, website support, Outreach, expenses for invited preachers, Christmas trees, flowers (for pastoral care, Easter and other special occasions), refreshment provisions and kitchen materials, Holy Communion elements, postage and envelopes. In other words, lots of small essential expenditures which all add up.

The second pie-chart summarises the sources of regular **income**.



As I will continue to repeat on many more occasions, the church is immensely grateful to everyone for their generosity in giving, by whatever means, weekly, monthly and from time to time. The chart reveals how dependent we are on claiming gift-aid from HMRC on offerings etc declared by taxpayers and on all cash donations of up to £30 per person per occasion; the amount which accounts for the 17% of income is £4200.

This has been a brief overview: do contact me if you have any queries, but be assured that detailed, audited annual accounts are scrutinised and approved by the Church Council at its Autumn meetings.
