Dear All,

"I was here first!"

I can remember our children saying this so often as they competed for the best seat in front of the television or the front seat of the car (when the children were the only passengers, of course). And as they got older and wiser, the eldest of the siblings would make the same claim justifying it by the fact that he was born first!

I remember attending a demonstration session of 'Godly Play'. A group, were introduced to the familiar story of the birth of Jesus. The story teller does this by using simple figures which are placed carefully on a large circle of fabric on the floor as the story is told and then offers the listeners a time in which to 'wonder' and talk about what they have seen and heard. The figures represented the baby Jesus in the manger, Mary, Joseph, shepherds, angels, wise men and animals.

Often there are new insights as a result of the story being told in this way.

What was unusual for me was that the story teller placed the figure of baby Jesus in the manger in the circle of fabric at the beginning. For a brief but important moment I saw the child in the manger alone, with his arms outstretched to the world which was represented by the circle of fabric.

Often when we tell the story of Christmas, we give first priority to the more 'attractive' characters and features – the angels, the wise men and the shepherds. It is sad to say but I have even known a nativity play in the past at which we had to scratch around at the very last minute to wrap a towel shaped appropriately in a blanket for the part of the baby Jesus because no one had remembered to bring a doll to take the part!

In the Bible, the start of John's Gospel is a challenging one to understand but it does remind us that

"In the beginning the Word already existed; the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John chapter 1 verses 1 & 2)

and if we think of 'the Word' as being Jesus, then we cannot help but get the priorities right this Christmas as we seek to put Jesus first. But as someone pointed out to me once, 'putting Jesus first' doesn't mean putting him first ahead of family or ahead of a career or ahead of a hobby, it means putting Jesus first in family and in career and in your hobby.

So whether you are reading this at the beginning of the advent season as we begin to prepare to celebrate Christ's birth again or nearer to Christmas day itself remember that Jesus was here first.

The Church Weekend Away in 2017

We are returning to Beth Eden in Llandudno next year. The weekend is Friday 6th October to Sunday 8th October. Put it in your diary now – the booking forms will be out in January.

Spiritual Committee

Last quarter, we celebrated a wonderful weekend combining the **Harvest and Flower Festivals** (see the centre spread): not least, it was spiritually uplifting as we welcomed a few hundred visitors to the church and enjoyed acts of worship and thanksgiving morning and evening on the Sunday. It was good to read about it in the Methodist Recorder newspaper a few weeks later.

In November, we brought and dedicated shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child, stood in solemn Remembrance for those fallen in wars and, at the end, entered Advent. How time flies – it'll soon be Christmas again.

An **Advent liturgy** will be used each Sunday and on Christmas Day, kindly prepared this year by our minister, the Revd Sue Levitt. Advent is a time of anticipation and preparation which leads into Christmas and the birth of Jesus, but in some ways it is more important than Christmas: as an eminent biblical scholar has reflected 'take Christmas out of the bible and you lose four chapters at most: remove Advent and you lose most of the New Testament and half the Old'. Now there's something to ponder.

The pattern of worship over the **Christmas and New Year** season will be as follows:

- December 18th Norley@9, focussing on the work of Christian Aid
- December 18th at 4 pm: Carol Service – a traditional service of (well-known) carols, lessons and readings arranged by the Spiritual Committee (see below)
- December 25th at 9.30 am: Christmas Day service led by the Rev'd Sue Levitt
- January 1st 2017 at 10.45 am: Morning Service on New Year's Day led by Mr John Bell
- January 8th at 10.45 am: Annual Covenant Service led by the Rev'd Sue Levitt

There will be no services at 10.45 am on December 18th or in the evenings of December 25th, January 1st or January 8th.

The **Spiritual Committee** will meet on Tuesday December 6th at 7.00 pm at 2, The Old Orchard, Cuddington, to plan the carol service and also to make arrangements for the March to May quarter. Anyone is welcome to join us. We have noted that the first Sunday in Lent is March 5th – the beginning of the next Preaching Plan.

Cafe Church will meet on November 30th (to avoid 'fixture congestion' the following week, when it would normally happen), then again on February 1st. The Spiritual Committee felt that to meet on January 4th (after an event in the afternoon – see elsewhere in Outreach, coupled with the holiday period) would be a step too far.

Norley@9 will meet on the 3rd Sunday each month, as per the usual pattern, i.e. December 18th, January 15th and February 19th.

Finally, at 3pm on January 22nd, there will be a service at St Laurence's Frodsham to mark the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity at which we understand either the President or Vice-President of the Methodist Conference will be present, and therefore we shall support that event and cancel the evening service at Norley.

Further details of all services and other events will be advertised, as ever, in the weekly notice-sheet.

Financial Report

The financial report for the December edition of Outreach gives an overview of the accounts for the year ending on August 31st 2016 and an outlook for the year 2016-17.

The October Church Council approved the accounts for 2015-16 as presented, subject to the customary audit. As we fully appreciate, Richard Ramsbottom, our auditor, has had much more important concerns in recent weeks and there is still plenty of time before the signed off accounts have to be submitted to the Circuit.

However, on the assumption that the Treasurer's figures are correct, it can be reported that the balances in the church accounts at the end of August totaled £13,781. This was an increase on the previous year which enabled us to achieve our stated reserves policy as is required by the Methodist Church, with a little room to spare – but we have commitments to meet too!

Income in the main church account (i.e. excluding collections passed through and church weekend transactions) was £25,126 and expenditure £22,565, giving a surplus of £2561, as against a balanced budget. This arose from some small overall income gains, noting that weekly offerings slightly exceeded budget, and larger expenditure savings mainly comprising £800 allocated towards future external church painting, a much reduced utility bill (by £600) and deferred property projects. The property projects will be carried out in 2016-17 and we also are obliged to repay the first half, i.e. £1250, of the District loan which helped pay for the solar panels in March 2017.

As ever in these reports, we recognise our gratitude for the various events which generate income during the year: in 2015-16, Open Door lunches £920, Carol Singing for two nights £655, the Safari Supper netted £1019, the New Year Party £185, the Harvest Supper £170 and the pre-Christmas Coffee Morning £443.

The maximum income limit on small donations (cash, up to £20) was increased by HMRC in April 2016 from £5000 to £8000, thus giving us more headroom for claims. In 2015-16 we hit the limit of £5000 which enabled us to claim £1250.

Overall, the church accounts were in a sound position as we entered 2016-17, and a balanced budget had been prepared and agreed of just a few pounds under £25,000 income and expenditure. It is too early to make further forecasts, but nothing alarming has happened to date (mid-November). Indeed, the very successful Flower Festival generated a surplus of £1065 plus £422 in gift-aid (additional to the budget), giving a total of £1487 compared with the Treasurer's conservative figure of £800.

The church finances are in good shape, at least at the moment.

Judith was born in Norley, the younger of twin girls. Her sister Gillian being 10 minutes older! They were the first set of twins to be baptised here in this chapel and were regular attenders of the Sunday School taking active parts in the Sunday School anniversaries, and enjoying the Sunday School trips to Rhyl and other places. Her faith has always meant a lot to her even though she didn't always attend church, her prayer time each day was important to her.

She and her sister attended the Primary School here in Norley and then went on to Helsby High School. One day when she was standing at a bus stop a young man waved from his car... she waved back and he stopped and they chatted and he even helped her with her homework, and then they went their separate ways. The young man berated himself for not having the courage to ask her out.... 2 years passed and Judith and Gillian were working at labs at ICI Runcorn - on different floors but near enough to have lunchbreaks together. Judith became lab manager and was always meticulous in all she did. Gillian was going out with a boy named Paul who asked his best friend Graham to go on a double date with Gillian's twin sister. Graham reluctantly agreed. When Judith and Graham met they realised it wasn't the first time they'd spoken to one another remembering the time at the bus stop. This time they didn't let it go as just a one off and have been together ever since, both twins marrying their respective beaus a few months apart, 46 years ago, again in this church.

Family meant everything to Judith. Sshe and her sister and their respective partners did everything together... even starting a family at the same time. She was so proud of her children, Rachel and Steven and encouraged them in all they wanted to do. She affectionately called Steven "little Runt" even when he grew to be 6 foot 3 and a father of her 2 grandchildren whom she adored. Rachel told me she was a wonderful mum if not a very good cook!

Judith and Gillian remained very close enjoying shopping together whenever the opportunity arose. Holidays were also a very special time when both families went away together and shared in fun and games, and Judith was particularly enthusiastic at tennis. Gillian has a special memory of Judith running along the beach laughing in Bournemouth. Judith was liked by everyone, nothing ever ruffled her, she would talk to anyone about anything, enjoying a joke with friends and family even at her own expense. She was meticulous in everything, including her gardening which she enjoyed greatly, moving plants to optimum positions for variety of colour etc. to the point where a neighbour once commented that the plants must be dizzy from all their moving around!

Sadly in the past few years Judith was diagnosed with PSP and life was a struggle particularly in the past two years, but Judith always remained positive and interested in what everyone was doing.

So today we give thanks for Judith, for all that she has meant in so many different ways and we thank God for all those special memories of her, for all the love she shared, for all she has taught in the way she has lived her life which means she will live on in your lives and in your hearts as you share that love and care with others.

But now for Judith the trials and tribulations of this world are over and death is past and I know that she has gone to be in God's house where there is no more pain, and no more suffering, and I know she will have been received into the loving arms of her Heavenly Father with the words 'Well done my good and faithful servant'. Amen.

The civil war in Syria has triggered the world's largest humanitarian crisis since the Second World War. Not a day goes by without references in the media to the atrocities inflicted by all sides on the people of Syria. But the Refugee Crisis it is not just about displaced Syrians; according to the United Nations High Commission for Refugees, there are almost 65 million (equivalent to the population of the United Kingdom) forcibly displaced people world-wide. This means that in the world as a whole, one out of every 122 people is an asylum-seeker, refugee or displaced person. These displaced people are in and from Iraq, Afghanistan, Somalia, DR Congo, Eritrea, Sudan, Congo, and of course Syria.

The EU and its Member States have provided over €5 billion for assistance to Syrians in their own country (over 13 million in need of humanitarian support) and to Syrian refugees and their host communities in Lebanon (over 1 million), Jordan (over 600,000), Iraq (over 200,000), Turkey (over 2.5 million) and Egypt (over 100,000).

Jesus said if we want to do something for him, we should feed the hungry and welcome the stranger –“if you did it to one of the least of these, you did it to me” (Matt 25:40). Working with partner organisations on the Serbia/Macedonia border, Christian Aid is providing food, shelter and help to Syrian families as close to their homelands as they safely can and with the hope of future resettlement. This Christmas Christian Aid is looking to its volunteers and supporters to 'Light the Way' – a campaign of prayer, donations, and representation, and we at Norley Methodist Church are no strangers to supporting Christian Aid's invaluable work. Your prayers, donations and active interest in Christian Aid's work are vital to, and will help, the current situation. There will be an envelope collection during December (see Church Notices for details) and the December Norley@9 Service (18th December) will focus on this topic.

May we all pray and hope for a world where all of God's children shall live in safety, where love has no borders and no bounds, and justice and peace are available to all. In Jesus' name. Amen.
