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Dear Friends,

Occasionally as I'm flicking through the TV channels looking for something to watch I'll stumble across some documentary which, like Dan Brown's fictitious *The Da Vinci Code*, claims that the Christian story that we know is an institutional stitch-up. Such programmes claim that through the agency of Christian Roman emperors and popes, the version of the Christian story that we have received is a spin-doctored account, engineered to support the agenda and power claims of the powerful.

If that is so, then they have done a spectacularly poor job of it! The Christmas story that we have received from our forebears actually points in the opposite direction.

Writing to a well-connected Greek man called Theophilus, it is Luke and only Luke, that tells us that the first visitors to Jesus were uneducated shepherds. It is only in Matthew, written to a Jewish audience dispersed throughout the Roman world that we read that God revealed Jesus' birth by means of the Zoroastrian astrology of the Persian fire-priests known as Magi. Meanwhile, John uses his fluency in Greek philosophy to turn it on its head. Instead of entreating his readers to reach God by escaping from this world to enlightened wisdom as children of Aristotle and Plato, John insists that God is moving in the opposite direction! For John, the divine reason and creator has become fully human, pitching his tent in the midst of *this* world and *this* life and seeking us out directly. When compared to other religions one of the most striking things about the New Testament is the complete absence of priests. The God we know in Jesus reaches out to us as individuals within the community. Intermediaries with all of their trappings and power claims are redundant.

When people tell me why they think that Christian faith is foolish, my response is to suggest that it's even worse than they describe. Think about it for a moment. Through our readings and carols this Christmas we're claiming that the one God that instigated and sustained the creation of two trillion galaxies becomes human, is born to a provincial teenage village girl and is laid in a cow trough. Utter bonkers!

And yet, for two thousand years people like you and me have dared to place their trust in this story and in the unexpected God that it describes. In doing so we have found that it is *this* understanding that fills us with an uncommon sense, resonates with our experience and sets fire to our souls! I pray that we'll embrace once again the weirdness (holiness) of the Christmas story and find ourselves caught up that "uncreated light, shining through infant eyes".

Happy Christmas!

Autumn Church Council Meeting

The Church Council met on October 4th and its first task was to confirm its membership. The Stewards and Representatives appointed at the May Annual Church meeting were duly agreed (the full list was reported in the June Outreach magazine). Additionally, Margaret Hogan was reappointed as Pastoral Secretary, John Bell as Treasurer and Lesley Gough as Church Council Secretary.

Other roles and responsibilities that continue are:

Ruth Lane - Senior Steward and Safeguarding Lead

Bruce Lane – Property Steward (with John Dimelow and Lewis Dimelow as Deputies).

Michael Gough – Chair of Spiritual Committee

Alison Twinn and Yvonne Roughsedge – Communion Stewards

Reports from the Spiritual Committee, Finance, and Property matters are covered in more detail elsewhere in this magazine. The Autumn Church Council meeting always has a very full agenda, as it includes presentation and approval of numerous key reports and documents. Thank you to everyone who worked on preparing these papers and reports on behalf of the Church Council and the wider Church membership.

Here is a summary of the main items discussed and agreed at the meeting:

- A return to pre-covid arrangements for Holy Communion was agreed though we will still use the disposable cups and communion wafers for the time being.
- A planned joint meeting with Kingsley Stewards (Hurst and Blakelees) was noted. This will be an opportunity to consider how we could work more collaboratively. We agreed that we would also like to work more closely with St John's, Norley.
- A separate meeting (reported elsewhere) to discuss some additional social activities as part of our Outreach to the local community was also noted.

- Our charitable giving continues most recently with a fundraising concert in aid of OPAL, donations to the Foodbank (regular donations as well as food gifts and monetary donation from Harvest), Shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child, and a final collection total of £2042 from Norley and the surrounding area for Christian Aid. The Church Council agreed that the collection from Carol Singing this year will be given to the Salvation Army and Northwich Citizens Advice, and the Christmas Day collection will be given to Action for Children.
- Several key documents were approved: the Church Accounts for 2021-22, the Safeguarding Policy, the Health and Safety Policy, the Annual Church Return, and the Annual Property Checklist.
- The biggest property project for next year, external re-decoration of the Church, was agreed along with some smaller projects. We also intend to develop a plan to update the Open Door Room.
- The update from the Circuit, highlighted the ongoing issues with reduced Presbyter and Local Preacher availability for services. A new Deacon has been appointed and is based in Chester (Wesley).
- There will be a modest increase in rental charge for use of the building by external groups.

The next Church Council meeting will be held on 21/3/2023.

Remembrance Day Service November 13th

This was the first time God Save the King had been sung in the church for at least 70 years.

A few of us have been to visit a wonderful community café, which operates one day a week and is based in Sandiway. It's given us lots of ideas for maybe something more ambitious in Norley....



We're also keen to see how we can introduce some new elements to our worship at Norley – perhaps some new music and different styles of Worship which have been well received elsewhere in the Circuit.

In conclusion – it was good to share many interesting ideas and to see some real enthusiasm, which we hope we can now turn into action!

Financial Report: praise for the past and trust for the future

Like many contributions to Outreach, the financial piece reports on the past, which is known, and speaks of the future which is known only in part.

As every year, the full Annual Report and Accounts for 2021-22 were presented to and adopted by the Autumn Church Council, with grateful thanks to Richard Ramsbottom who examined them and affirmed their accuracy.

The completed Standard Form of Accounts, required of all Methodist churches, was duly signed and copied to the Circuit Treasurer. All righteousness has thereby been fulfilled. The Reserves Policy was adopted, ensuring that we always have financial provision both for the unexpected (about 6 months' expenditure, as recommended by the Methodist Church) and for planned major expenses (in our case, the external painting of the church buildings in the summer of 2023).

Despite the continued ups and downs consequential on the effects of covid, we recorded a surplus of £868 in the year 2021-22, giving a total balance on August 31st 2022 of £22,938, of which £21,646 was held in the Methodist Church Central Finance Board deposit account and £1292 in the NatWest current account. It is worth noting that £5716 (of the total annual income of £34,745, i.e.16%) was received from HMRC as a result of gift-aid being claimed on offerings and donations: we would be struggling without it – hence the treasurer's repeated reminders of its importance! During the year, the splendid sum of £4087 was donated to fourteen different charitable organisations, including £1062 to the West Cheshire foodbank and £1000 to the Ukraine appeal launched by All We Can, the Methodist relief and development agency. We offer our 'praise for the past'.

For the year 2022-23, the Autumn Council agreed that donations be made of £100 to Norley News and £200 to Englesea Brook Chapel and Museum; that the proceeds of the Autumn Concert (reported elsewhere in Outreach) would go to OPAL (as it turned out, £730); that proceeds from carol-singing in December will be split equally between the Salvation Army and the Northwich Citizens Advice Bureau; that Christian Aid will be the beneficiary of any fund-raising event arranged in 2023; and that the cash collection taken at the Christmas Day service will go to Action for Children.

But for the necessary inclusion of the external painting estimate (the cost will be met from reserves accumulated for the purpose), the budget for 2022-23 showed a small deficit of £500, which is not a cause for concern. As is often observed in business, this figure is simply the difference between two large numbers – income and expenditure – and is based on many assumptions, aka 'trust for the future'. We do not have any debts or outstanding loans. As reported to the Autumn Church Council, the treasurer therefore judges the financial outlook for the year to be resilient, and our reserves offer some protection should a significant emergency expenditure come unexpectedly.

We continue to be immensely grateful for the generosity of the members of our congregation and wider church community: your commitment enables us to sustain a firm financial foundation for God's mission through Norley Methodist Church – so, many thanks indeed!



And finally, owing to the craftsmanship and generosity of Brian Moores, of The Hurst at Kingsley, in making a wooden stand from the pews removed from that church, we are now able to resume the use of the beautiful red offertory bags acquired not so long ago. The act of dedication of our offerings of money and ourselves has thereby been resurrected as an integral part of our Sunday worship.

Foodbank Update

The Trussell Trust, the organisation which runs the biggest Foodbank Network, including those in West Cheshire, in Runcorn and in Mid Cheshire, has recently reported an unprecedented increase in the number of food parcels distributed.

Between April and September 2022, 25% more food parcels were distributed, compared to the same period in 2021. The Charity is predicting a 'Tsunami of Need' over the coming months as people struggle amidst the soaring costs of living. They have also noted that one in five people using the Foodbanks are now from working households, who are really struggling to make ends meet.

Our recent Harvest Collection (together with Norley Stores) was 146kg of food and other non-perishable items, along with cash donations of £196.25, inc. gift aid –a fantastic total!

This year we will be taking food and other essential items to the collection depot **during the week commencing 12th December** – and so if you would like to donate food or other essentials, or maybe some Christmas treats, please could these be placed in the collection box by **Sunday 11th December**. This will mean that everything donated can be distributed and given to those in need, in time for Christmas. Monetary donations are also gratefully received via the collection basket in our Open Door Room.
